WORLD WAR 1 – THE SINKING OF THE LUSITANIA

My Great Great Uncle, Joseph Rafferty, was a son of my Great Great Great Great Grandparents, Patrick and Rose Rafferty. He was born in Cooley, Lower Willville, Carlingford, County Louth. At the age of 19 he was boarding with the Dullaghan family in Liverpool and was working as a dock labourer. At age 23 Joseph was working as a fireman on board The Lusitania.

The Lusitania was a British luxury cruise ship. It mostly travelled across the Atlantic Ocean between Britain and the US carrying passengers and cargo. It was 787 feet long and could carry 3048 passengers and crew.

On the 1st May 1915 The Lusitania departed from New York on it's way to Liverpool. There were adverts in US papers from the German Embassy warning people that the ship may be attacked when entering British waters. People didn't believe that the Germans would attack a luxury ship with 1959 people on board including many children.

On the 7th May 1915 as The Lusitania approached the coastline of Ireland, the Germans attacked and fired a torpedo. The torpedo made a direct hit on the side of the ship causing an explosion. Within a few minutes the Captain gave the order to abandon ship. It took 18 minutes for The Lusitania to sink. Only 761 people survived. 1198 were killed.


The killing of so many innocent people by the Germans caused outrage across the world. Support for the Allies against Germany grew including the US who later joined the Allies in war against Germany.


Propaganda using the phrase "Remember The Lusitania" was used as a battle cry to recruit new soldiers.


My Great Great Uncle, Joseph Rafferty, was lost to the sea. He is commemorated at Tower Hill War Memorial in London.






WW1 Lost At Sea 1915



Lusitania, British ocean liner, the sinking of which by a German U-boat on May 7, 1915, contributed indirectly to the entry of the United States into World War I.







The **Tower Hill Memorial** is a pair of Commonwealth War Graves Commission memorials in Trinity Square, on Tower Hill in London, England. The memorials, one for the First World War and one for the Second. commemorate civilian merchant sailors and fishermen who were killed as a result of enemy action and have no known grave. The first, the Mercantile Marine War Memorial, was designed by Sir Edwin Lutyens and unveiled in 1928; the second, the Merchant Seamen's Memorial, was designed by Sir Edward Maufe and unveiled in 1955. A third memorial, commemorating merchant sailors who were killed in the 1982 Falklands War, was added to the site in 2005.


